The four recipients of the Macular Disease Society's Chairman's Award are 60-year-old Alan Macfarlane, a volunteer who runs a local support group in Peterborough; Les Geddes who invented the Geddes Reader; Phyll Pridemore, founder and group leader of the Stockport MDS group; and 66-year-old Wendy Pepper who runs her local support group in Barnt Green, Birmingham.

A special ceremony will be held in honour of this year's winners in London on September 25.
